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The Crisis in Manipur

Manipur, a northeastern state of India, has been facing a prolonged period of violence and instability since 2023. What began as ethnic tensions has evolved into a serious humanitarian and political crisis, affecting thousands of lives and disrupting normal life across the state. The root of the crisis lies in tensions between two major communities:

- › The meitei community, mostly living in the Imphal Valley.
- › The Kuki-Zo tribal groups, residing in the surrounding hill areas.

The conflict intensified in May 2023 after a dispute over granting Scheduled Tribe (ST) status to the Meiteis. Tribal groups opposed this move, fearing loss of land rights, job reservations, and political representation. What followed was large-scale violence, destruction of homes, and deep division between communities. The crisis has had devastating consequences:

- › Over 260 people killed.
 - › More than 60,000 displaced into relief camps.
 - › Thousands of homes and properties destroyed.
- Entire communities have become segregated, with "buffer zones" separating Meitei and Kuki areas, making interaction nearly impossible.

Even now, the situation remains volatile -

- ▷ A bomb attack killed two children, triggering fresh violence and protests.
- ▷ Clashes between protesters and security forces led to additional deaths and injuries.
- ▷ Violence has also broken out after incidents like drug seizures and militant attacks.
- ▷ Leaders are now emphasizing dialogue between communities as the only solution.

These incidents show that peace remains fragile and easily disrupted.

The crisis has also affected governance, such as the state was placed under president's Rule in 2025 due to prolonged unrest, challenges still remain unresolved and key issues like justice, rehabilitation, and trust building are still pending. Hence, this conflict has deeply affected everyday life of families, they have been displaced and live in relief camps, education and economic activities have been disrupted, women and children are among the most affected, moreover, Internet shutdowns and curfews have limited communication and movement.

The situation in Manipur is not just a law-and-order problem but a complex issue involving identity, land, and political rights. Hence, peace cannot be restored through force alone; It requires long term political and social solutions.
